

The 2020 AGM Takes Place... Virtually

The Blue Sea Lake Watershed Association held its 12th Annual General Meeting on Saturday, October 17th. The coronavirus pandemic obliged the Association to conduct the AGM virtually, via Zoom. The Assembly was also limited to the 232 members who had paid their 2020 membership dues, as it was not possible, with Zoom, to register people at the meeting. Despite the occasional technical glitches, the meeting turned out to be quite successful. Our thanks to all who attended for their participation and their forbearance.

The AGM was the occasion to review the activities of the Associaion. Despite the restrictions of the pandemic, 2020 has been a busy year. In addition to its regular program of water quality monitoring, the deployment of yellow demarcation buoys, and its other advocacy and education activities, the Association, with the help of volunteers and local support, carried out the installation of the biodegradable jute tarps in Blue Sea Lake and raised more than \$20,000 through the generous contribution of members to cover our share of the costs.

New Initiatives: Assembly heard the results of a survey of members on lakeside fireworks (see next article) and was advised of a new initiative to consolidate the laws, regulations, and best practices on boating and navigation into a comprehensive and usable set of navigation guidelines to ensure that users of the watershed abide by these rules.

Open Discussion: As always, members were given the opportunity to share their concerns and suggestions during the "open disucssion" portion of the meeting. Questions were raised about whether more should be done to prevent phosphates and excessive

nutrients from entering our lakes and waterways. The importance of the yellow buoy program was reaffirmed, as was the need to continue with the Association's educational activities and outreach to new cottagers and residents, as well as those renting premises on lakes in the watershed. It was suggested as well that – 10 years later - it might be time for an update to the comprehensive baseline study on the environmental state of the watershed known as the Geiger Report that was produced by the Association in 2010.


Since 2018, Nicholas has participated as a volunteer in the efforts of the Blue Sea Lake Watershed Association's to control the spread of Eurasian Milfoil in Blue Sea Lake by helping to identify Milfoil concentrations, collecting GPS coordinates, creating maps, and implementing yellow buoys and signs. He is excited at the opportunity to contribute to the Association and to make a difference for the lake and people who reside there.

Both Gabriel and Nicholas are great additions to the Board. In addition to their professional skills, they each bring integrity, competence, and enthusiasm, are effective communicators, and fluently bilingual, both written and orally.

The Association Surveys its Members on Lakeside Fireworks

Launching fireworks near the lake leaves chemical debris in the lake, which is why the Association has been opposed to the practice. We would like to see them curbed or even stopped altogether. Yet, we acknowledge that, while some people may find them unpleasant, fireworks can be popular with others. So we decided to canvas our members on the their views. An online survey was circulated to 232 registered members and the results reported at the AGM.





Of the 80 replies received, 77 respondents indicated they were opposed or strongly opposed, while 3 were in favour. We consider these results to be sufficiently clear to continue the discussion with our local municipal representatives regarding the possibility of adopting measures aimed at limiting the practice of launching fireworks near the lakes. We believe that limiting the fireworks to a few specific occasions during the summer (for example, long weekends) would be a reasonable option. If you agree, we encourage you to contact your local conucillor at Blue Sea or Messines and make your views known.


