

#### **Association Outreach**

In an effort to gain a greater appreciation of local environmental issues and initiatives and - at the same time - develop closer relations with like-minded organizations, Don Karn and Dick Ryan met with their counterparts from the Cedar Lake association<sup>3</sup> on 14 January and, two weeks later, with their confreres from the 31 Mile Lake association<sup>4</sup>. Both meetings proved most

worthwhile as they gave all parties an opportunity to share their experiences and compare notes on such issues as invasive species, septic system management, and shoreline revegetation. Although it was acknowledged that each association has its own unique problems, all agreed that only through the coordinated collective action of our associations will we be able to surmount the many common challenges we face in our effort to protect and preserve our watersheds for future generations.

# The Presence of Aquatic Plants in Blue Sea Lake

Last year, several residents of Blue Sea Lake asked us about the increasing number of aquatic plants appearing near the shoreline. After discussing this with several biologists, we have concluded that the plants in question are part of the pondweed family.

The pondweed is an indigenous plant that provides both food and shelter for marine fauna. It is found along shorelines out to a depth of 3 metres. Like Eurasian milfoil, pondweed reproduces in a variety of ways and, as a result, can spread very easily.



The most effective way to limit its growth is to reduce the amount of phosphorous entering the lake. However, reducing phosphorus input is much easier said than done, and remains one of the great challenges of our Association. 
## **Website Update**




website. We encourage you to notify us at info@assocationbleusea.org should you experience any problems accessing the site.
